PURPOSE AND USES OF CDBG FUNDS

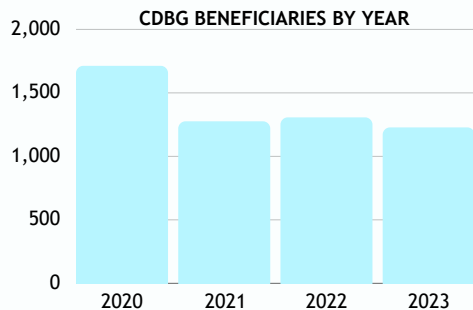
The City of Beloit receives an allocation of CDBG funding each year based on a formula. Funds may be used for City-run programs, or awarded to eligible non-profits to carry out on behalf of the City.

The primary objective of the CDBG program is the development of viable urban communities, which are achieved by providing the following, principally for persons of low and moderate income:

- Decent housing
- A suitable living environment
- Expanded economic opportunities

CDBG PUBLIC SERVICE BENEFICIARIES

Average number of residents assisted with CDBG-funded public services from 2020 through 2023: **1,380 residents/year**

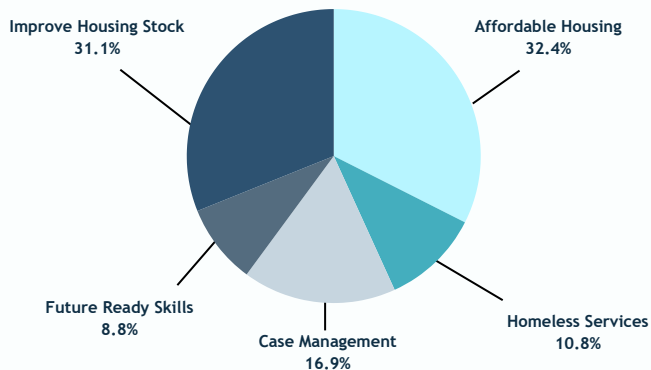


PUBLIC SERVICE ACTIVITY TYPES 2020- 2024

Per CDBG regulations, up to 15% of a community's annual CDBG funds may be used for public service activities. Additional funds may be used for public services specifically benefitting the City's Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Areas (NRSA), which are the Merrill and Hackett neighborhoods.

COVID-19 RELIEF

The City of Beloit received a total of **\$715,678** in CDBG-Coronavirus funding to respond to impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on low- to moderate-income residents. A total of **712 residents** were assisted from 2020- 2023.
